Her time at Wolf Haven was relaxed and serene, but her soon-to-be-consistent movement impairment and a decline from cancer called for more concern. The animal care team and our attending veterinarian made the immensely tough decision to help her rest. Quin's time at Wolf Haven was short, but time doesn't dictate the love and passion she made everyone she met feel.
